She said that in her few encounters with brother, SIRHAN, her conversations were always short and very light, never discussing anything such as politics or ideologies. She stated that she never remembers his brother to display any sign of temper or violence in her presence.

She said that the upper floor of the Pazz Restaurant was a very pro-Arab nationalist environment. On the night that Senator KENNEDY was assassinated, several of the individuals there, whom she did not know by name, indicated that they were glad that the "Jewish lover" was dead. She stated also that she sensed, among many of the Arab people at the Pazz, the strong feeling of anti-Americanism.

He was admitted to the United States at New York, New York, on January 12, 1957.

On his original immigration to the United States, he and the members of the family accompanying him were sponsored in the United States by []. By letter dated August 31, 1957, to Immigration and Naturalization Service, [] advised Immigration and Naturalization Service that he originally met the SIRHAN family in the City of Jerusalem in 1955 and made arrangements to sponsor the family into the country. The wife and children seemed to be very happy in the United States. The father was unhappy and dissatisfied.

[] assisted him in obtaining employment but SIRHAN quit his job, stating that the work was too hard and the hours too long. He informed [] that he was very unhappy in the United States, he did not like the customs or the laws here, that he could not make his family mind as in his homeland and he considered returning to Jordan.

set forth quotes from letters he had received from SIRHAN prior to their arrival in this country: "If you sponsor us you will be delivering a Christian family from absolute darkness and hopelessness. I assure you that I will be willing to perform any type of service or job in whatsoever nature - garden, servant, sweeper - humbly and mildly. I have a sincere purpose to become a U.S. countryman with a willingness and readiness to do any kind of work to the satisfaction of any employer."

stated that SIRHAN failed to live up to these statements. A postscript to the letter was as follows: "Mr. SIRHAN has, aside from the things mentioned above, been very brutal to his children."

By letter dated February 27, 1960, requested information concerning the whereabouts of SIRHAN. In this letter she said he was "an undesirable alien no doubt. His family are fine, hard-working, worthy people and are getting along fine...."

U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, Federal Building, Los Angeles, on June 7, 1968, made available a certified copy of a City of Pasadena, Department of Health Certificate of Death, Number 7039-424, reflecting that subject's sister, AIDA SIRHAN MENNELL, died on March 20, 1965, at 6:05 a.m. This certificate reflects her father as BISHARA SIRHAN-JORDAN and her mother as MARY MISHNER-JORDAN. This certificate reflects the cause of death as acute plastic crisis (anemia) secondary to chronic myelocytic leukemia. The certificate reflected that MENNELL was buried on March 23, 1965, at Forest Lawn Cemetery and that WILLIAM T. STAHMAN of the Lamb Funeral Home, Pasadena, California, was the embalmer.

Captioned individual has never been married.

He has never been in the Armed Forces. He obtained his present employment on October 4, 1967, and for approximately one and one-half years prior to this he had almost no employment of any kind and was supported by his mother. He has no assets and no liabilities except for the cost of an attorney regarding his deportation proceedings, which his brothers are financing. His health is good except for some difficulty with his eyes. He claims to be of Protestant faith and he occasionally attends church. He does not belong to any organizations, clubs or unions. His principal leisure interests are in rebuilding and selling bicycles and raising parakeets.

Captioned individual was taken into custody on June 10, 1966, by California State Narcotic Officers and the Pasadena Police Department, for an alleged violation of Section 11530 of the Health and Safety Code, being in possession of marijuana, and Section 11531, offering to sell marijuana. On October 13, 1966, he was found guilty as charged on both counts. He was placed on five years' probation, with the first year of probation to be spent in the Los Angeles County Jail.

On January 11, 1967, he was ordered to show cause under Section 241 (a) (11), as to why he should not be deported, and on July 11, 1967, a Special Inquiry Officer ordered him deported to Jordan.

On July 24, 1967, he made a motion for reconsideration of above order, which was denied by a Special Inquiry Officer on September 7, 1967.

On March 27, 1968, the Board of Immigration Appeals remanded his case to a Special Inquiry Officer to consider jurisdiction of the sentencing court in entering a subsequent order setting aside the finding of "guilty" to above charges and certifying captioned individual to the Juvenile Court.

As of June 5, 1968, the decision of the Special Inquiry Officer on remand was pending.

On Form PS 511, United States of American Immigration and Alien Registration Report No. [] issued to SAIDALLAH BISHARA SALAMAH GHATTAS SIRHAN, it is reflected that, on a nonquota symbol X-10, Immigration Visa No. [] was issued March 23, 1960 and scheduled to expire June 22, 1960 to Jordanian Passport No. 077730. The visa further reflected that the immigrant arrived at the port of New York via M/n Saturnia on June 27, 1960.

Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) files reflect that SAIDALLAH BISHARA SIRHAN entered Petition No. 272786 under Section 316 in U. S. District Court, Los Angeles, California, on October 1, 1965.

After interview with INS examiner, petition was withdrawn on May 16, 1966.

This individual was born[] and his nationality is listed as Jordanian, according to an application for an immigrant visa and alien registration made by him at the American Embassy, Amman, Jordan, on March 23, 1960.

In this application he indicated that his purpose in going to the United States was to join the remainder of his family for permanent residence. He indicated that he would join his mother, MARY BISHARA SALAMEH GHATTAS SIRHAN at

He indicated that he was single and that his brother SAIDALLAH D.S.G. SIRHAN was immigrating with him.

He indicated that he can speak, read, and write Arabic and could speak English and read and write some English. He claimed that he had never previously been in the United States.

On the application he claimed to be a non-quota immigrant and his claim was based on the fact that he was a refugee escapee falling within the provisions of Section 15 (a) (3) of the Act of September 11, 1957. He stated that his application was approved by the Department of State, Case Number

With the application he submitted a birth certificate, good conduct police certificate, medical certificate and statement of evidence of support furnished by the [redacted] which guarantees that immigrant would be properly resettled, adequately housed, and suitably employed.

On March 23, 1960, he was issued non-quota visa number [redacted] at the American Embassy, Amman, Jordan, under Section 15 (a) (3) of the Act of September 11, 1957.

He had a Jordanian passport Number [redacted] which was issued April 5, 1955.

This individual arrived at New York, New York, June 27, 1960, on the "M/D Saturnia" and was admitted to the United States on that date.

This individual has [redacted] which indicates that he was arrested by the Pasadena, California, Police Department on December 18, 1963, when he was charged with attempted murder. On March 4, 1964, this charge was reduced to four counts of breaking or removing vehicle parts.

After a jury trial in the Municipal Court of Pasadena, California, extending from December 19, 1963, through March 4, 1964, he was found not guilty on three counts and guilty of one count of breaking or removing vehicle parts without consent of owner.

It appeared to the court on January 24, 1964, that this defendant could be mentally ill.

On March 31, 1964, the case was called for hearing on probation and for sentence. The court ordered that further proceedings be suspended and defendant placed on probation for a period of one year on the terms and conditions that:

1. Defendant to cooperate with the probation officer in any plans for psychiatric, psychological, or other treatment.
2. Defendant to seek and maintain residence and employment as approved by the probation officer
3. Defendant not to further molest [redacted] or [redacted] or to go in the vicinity of their home.
4. Defendant to obey all laws, orders, rules, and regulations of the court and probation department.

It was further ordered that defendant return to court on July 16, 1964, with a report from a psychologist or a psychiatrist and for a hearing on progress under supervision.

On July 23, 1964, the case was called for further hearing on progress and it was ordered that probation be modified in that defendant need not report to the probation department. The matter was continued for further hearing on progress of defendant in obtaining employment and psychiatric or psychological counseling.

This matter was called for further hearing on October 27, 1964, at which time defendant was declared in violation of probation and probation was revoked; and he was ordered to pay a fine of \$150.00 or serve five days.

On November 23, 1964, this order was modified for defendant to pay three separate installments of \$50.00. On various dates, hearings on this matter were held to revise methods of payment.

On May 12, 1966, the court ordered that the finding of guilty entered on March 4, 1964, be vacated and the matter dismissed under the provisions of Section 1203.4 of the Penal Code of the State of California.

[REDACTED] stated that the former chairman of the Los Angeles Du Bois Club mentioned that members of the leadership of the SCDP had contacted him on June 6, 1958, with reference to statements attributed to Los Angeles Mayor SAM YORTY, which left the impression that SIRHAN SIRHAN was associated with the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America. They reportedly expressed great concern and inquired as to whether the chairman knew if SIRHAN SIRHAN had ever had any contact with, or was a member of, the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America. The chairman also reported that [REDACTED] had called a meeting of key members of the CP for the evening of June 6, 1958, to decide what action, if any, should be taken to disclaim that SIRHAN SIRHAN was affiliated with the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America. It was tentatively agreed that FRANKLIN ALEXANDER, former national chairman of the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America, and current member of the CP, would go to Columbia Broadcasting System, Inc., in Los Angeles, together with ROBERT DUGGAN, former chairman of the Los Angeles Du Bois Club and current chairman of the Youth Commission, SCDP, to deny that SIRHAN SIRHAN had ever been affiliated with the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America.

The Communist Party, USA (CP, USA), has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIANS TO ABOLISH THE HOUSE UN-AMERICAN ACTIVITIES COMMITTEE, Also Known As Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee, Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms

A source advised on January 25, 1966, that the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms, (CCPAF) 555 North Western Avenue, Los Angeles, California, had recently changed its name to Southern Californians for Abolition of the House Un-American Activities Committee.

The same source advised on May 11, 1967, that subsequent to the adoption of the new name in January, 1966, the officers began to refer to it by the name Southern Californians to Abolish the House Un-American Activities Committee. This is now the official name and the letterhead of the organization carries the name as "Southern Californians to Abolish HUAC".

The "Guide to Subversive Organizations", revised December 1, 1961, pp. 43-44, describes the CCPAF as follows:

"The Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms * * * specializes in propaganda aimed at abolishing the Committee on Un-American Activities and discrediting the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Created in Los Angeles in 1952, the front organization is run by FRANK WILKINSON, an identified Communist who recently resumed the full-time, paid post of executive secretary after approximately a year's leave of absence to assist in a similar campaign by another front in New York City, the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee.

"When the Committee on Un-American Activities held hearings in Los Angeles, September 2-5, 1958, to inquire into the nature of the Party's recent reorganization in California, the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms sponsored a series of public meetings to protest the hearings and the very existence of the Committee. Communists subpoenaed as witnesses were guests of honor.

"At this time, leaders of the Party's Southern California District were mobilizing Communists in the area for participation in an intensified campaign to abolish this committee of Congress. How the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms served the Party in this effort was revealed by (Communist Party) District Chairman DOROTHY HEALEY in a report to the Party's Southern California District Council on September 21, 1958. Mrs. HEALEY declared that the Party preferred public protest meetings to be held by the Citizens Committee to Preserve American Freedoms rather than under party auspices because Communists could attend without danger of being exposed as members of the Party. She also noted that Communists scheduled as congressional committee witnesses could not appear beforehand at open Communist rallies without creating the impression that the Party was conspiring with witnesses to withhold information from the committee."

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us". At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anticommunist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes", the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

W. E. B. DU BOIS CLUBS OF AMERICA (DCA)

A source advised that on October 26-27, 1963, a conference of members of the Communist Party, USA (CPUSA), including national functionaries, met in Chicago, Illinois, for the purpose of setting in motion forces for the establishment of a new national Marxist-oriented youth organization which would hunt for the most peaceful transition to socialism. The delegates were told that it would be reasonable to assume that the young socialists attracted into this new organization would eventually pass into the CP itself.

A second source has advised that the founding convention for the new youth organization was held from June 19-21, 1964, at 150 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco, California, at which time the name W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America (DCA) was adopted. Approximately 500 delegates from throughout the United States attended this convention.

The second source advised in September, 1966, that Mike Zagerell, CPUSA Youth Director, stated that in Negro communities the Party still supported the plan to build "left" socialist centers and to solidify the Party base through the DCA. This source also advised in September, 1966, that Daniel Rubin, CPUSA National Organizational Secretary, stated the Party believes the DCA should have a working-class outlook and be a mass organization favorable to socialism, socialist countries and Marxism, and in April, 1967, advised that Gus Hall, CPUSA General Secretary, indicated the DCA primary emphasis should be on developing mass resistance to the draft.

A third source advised in September, 1967, that Jarvis Tyner was elected chairman of the DCA on September 10, 1967, at the Third National Convention of the DCA held in New York, New York, from September 8-10, 1967.

A fourth source advised during August, 1967, that Jarvis Tyner is a member of the National Committee of the CPUSA.

A fifth source advised on September 21, 1967, that the headquarters of the DCA is located at 34 West 17th Street, New York, New York.

W. E. B. DU BOIS CLUB
OF WEST LOS ANGELES

On April 23, 1964, a source advised that the W.E.B. Du Bois Club of West Los Angeles, was organized by RUTH GREENBAUM with the assistance of MARVIN TREIGER in February, 1964.

A second source advised on April 17, 1964, that as of April, 1964, RUTH GREENBAUM was a member of the Southern California District Communist Party (SCDCP) and that MARVIN TREIGER was chairman of the Youth Commission, SCDCP.

The first source above stated that the Du Bois Club was organized mainly to meet the needs of Marxist-orientated students at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA), but that the club eventually hoped to spread its influence into other areas in West Los Angeles.

A third source advised on March 12, 1964, that at a Communist Party (CP) meeting held in Los Angeles, in February, 1964, BEN DOBBS, Executive Secretary of the SCDCP, spoke on the CP youth movement and stated that the Du Bois Club was one of two youth groups operating in the Los Angeles area, both groups were Marxist-orientated and that members considered themselves Marxist.

A fourth source advised on March 25, 1965, that since its inception, the activities of the Du Bois Club have been mainly limited to participation in protests against alleged racial discrimination, participation in Marxist classes, participation in conferences which led to the creation of the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America in the summer of 1964 and participation in demonstrations protesting U.S. intervention in Viet Nam. This source advised that the W.E.B. Du Bois Club of West Los Angeles is now affiliated with the W.E.B. Du Bois Clubs of America and is operating as a chapter of that organization.

OF WEST LOS ANGELES

The above source further advised on April 28, 1966, that in February, 1966, the Los Angeles area Du Bois Clubs consolidated into one large city-wide club known as the Los Angeles Du Bois Club. The West Los Angeles Du Bois no longer exists as a separate club but members of the club are now members of the UCLA committee, which is one of several committees formed at the time of consolidation of the Los Angeles area Du Bois Clubs.

This meeting took place during the early evening hours and the four of them sat at Bob's for a relatively short period of time. [redacted] was the first to pick up an association with SIRHAN because he was interested in Arabic. [redacted] wanted him to make friends with SIRHAN because he was a foreigner and she thought he might be interested in attending their church

SIRHAN attended Muir High School so he did not see him too often during high school years but did see him again at Pasadena City College in 1965.

[redacted] visited in the SIRHAN home occasionally but SIRHAN did not like having people such as [redacted] and another boy named [redacted] at his home because they were radical leftist types. Mrs. MARY SIRHAN did not seem to like [redacted] too well and as [redacted] said, "SIRHAN was never enthusiastic about me."

Through [redacted] efforts SIRHAN would occasionally come to the [redacted] during his high school years.

On 3/12/69 at Pasadena, California

took some pleasure in teasing SIRHAN and once told SIRHAN that [redacted] was Jewish. This infuriated SIRHAN and he stopped speaking to [redacted] for a period of time until someone told him he had been put on.

As they grew older, [redacted] and [redacted] became more radical and began to drink. [redacted] tried to get to attend some Du Bois Club parties in Highland Park area and [redacted] did attend two but does not recall SIRHAN going to these.

During the high school period, SIRHAN began to work, at first part time and then full time. He also took to drinking with [redacted] and others during this period.

[redacted] said he did not see much of SIRHAN through high school but saw him again in 1965 at Pasadena City College. He said that SIRHAN "was always hanging around the lounge".

[redacted] said he was amazed when he heard the news of SIRHAN having mortally wounded Senator ROBERT KENNEDY. He feels certain that he was drunk at the time. He mentioned that SIRHAN did not show the effects of alcohol as other persons did. He became quieter when he had been drinking, [redacted] said.

[redacted] said it is his feeling that all three persons, SIRHAN, [redacted] and [redacted] were and possibly still are, seriously emotionally disturbed.

[redacted] said the names of [redacted] and [redacted] or [redacted] are not familiar to him as friends of SIRHAN or of [redacted]

also expressed considerable suspicion as to how and why Russell Parsons was selected to represent Sirhan in the recent trial. He stated that it has come to his attention that Parsons had a considerable dislike for Robert Kennedy, because of Kennedy's alleged investigation of Parsons when he, Kennedy, was with the United States Senate Rackets Committee.

also advised that he has listened studiously and many times to the tape recording made of the interview with Sirhan by [redacted] at which time Sirhan was under hypnosis. One of the names mentioned by Sirhan, while under hypnosis, was [redacted]. According to [redacted] when the name of [redacted] was mentioned by Sirhan, [redacted] immediately made a reference to one [redacted] not further identified by [redacted] suggested that the [redacted] mentioned by Sirhan could be a reference to the late [redacted] recently found a victim of an overdose of narcotics in a Los Angeles motel, and who died in the Los Angeles County General Hospital. On the morning that [redacted] died at the hospital, [redacted] received an anonymous telephone call advising him that [redacted] was dead. The anonymous caller furnished no further information and the caller has not been identified. [redacted] has determined that one [redacted] visited [redacted] while she was in the hospital and prior to her death. He did not, however, have an opportunity to talk to her since she was comatose and never regained consciousness before she died.

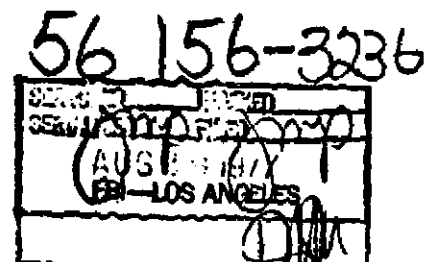

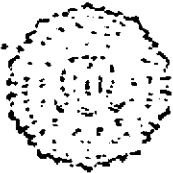

SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN

was present
at a Black Panther meeting on Central Avenue in Los Angeles, one month prior to the assassination of Robert F. Kennedy. According to [redacted] told him that Sirhan was present at the meeting. [redacted] specifically stated that he recalled Sirhan because Sirhan gave his name at that time as "Sirhan Sirhan", which the thought was unusual.

is also writing a book concerning the assassination and has advised [redacted] that he has seven reasons which he considers valid to suspect that a conspiracy actually did exist in the assassination. [redacted] proposed that [redacted] contact Sirhan and specifically ask him whether he, Sirhan, had actually attended a meeting of the Black Panthers in Los Angeles prior to the assassination of the late Robert F. Kennedy on June 5, 1965.

SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN

subsequently contacted [] and advised that he had interviewed Sirhan, which interview was recorded on tape. When [] asked Sirhan whether he had ever attended a Black Panther meeting, Sirhan became considerably upset; denied he had ever attended such a meeting, but told [] that he had in fact visited the Black Muslim Temple in Los Angeles.

information was to the effect that Sirhan had been observed [] at a meeting of that organization approximately one month prior to June 5, 1968.

was interviewed by representatives of the Los Angeles Office of the FBI.

explained that on one occasion prior to the assassination of the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy he, [] was in attendance at a meeting of the Black Congress (BC), which was opened to the public. During the course of that meeting, which was held at 7228 South Broadway, and which he recalls took place sometime in April or May 1968, a man who bore a strong resemblance to Sirhan and who was accompanied by two other individuals came into the meeting. [] specifically recalls that he heard a "commotion" during the course of the meeting, which was attended by approximately 50 to 60 people. Just prior to the commotion, Alprentice "Bunchy" Carter (now deceased) had been speaking. The individual whom [] felt resembled Sirhan got up and spoke about the "Muslims" somewhat in opposition to Carter's remarks.

SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN

During the conversation, did not recall that the name of Sirhan Sirhan was mentioned. In connection with the meeting at the EC, stated that at no time did he hear the name Sirhan Sirhan.

 indicated he expected that the FBI would contact him regarding the incident which allegedly occurred during the meeting.

Photographs of Sirhan were exhibited to who said that they are now familiar because of the recent publicity given the case during the trial of Sirhan. He stated he could not be absolutely certain that the individual he saw at the meeting was Sirhan. He could only state that it resembled him.

SARHAN BISHARA SIRHAN

was interviewed by representatives of this office on August 12, 1968, and did not mention anything regarding Sirhan Sirhan. It is noted that at this time, there was still considerable public attention on the Sirhan case as the assassination had occurred on June 5, 1968.

During the period preceding the assassination of the late Senator Robert F. Kennedy, racial informants of the Los Angeles Police Department and Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office had no reports on any Black Panther meetings as such at the BO Office although organizational activity did occur. No public type meetings were known to be held as none were reported.

A check for \$11,000 was cashed at the \$11,000 check from the late New York Senator, Robert F. Kennedy, a short time before his death, for which he made available to Kennedy. The day following Kennedy's death, attempted to cash Kennedy's check. The bank refused to honor the check. He visited with Ambassador Sargent Shriver, American Ambassador to France, and he was told to wait until Kennedy's affairs were put in order in Washington, D.C.

advised that on December 7, 1968, his property, which included the \$11,000 check, a suit, watch, and presents for the Kennedy children, disappeared at the Post Authority, New York City. He reported the loss to the Post Authority Police.

On September 8, 1977, SA's [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] interviewed SIRHAN SIRHAN in a classroom at Soledad Prison, Soledad, California. Prior to interview, SIRHAN was apprised of the identity of the interviewing Agents and it was indicated to him by SA [REDACTED] that the interview would concern a conspiracy to steal a nuclear device, a matter of prosecutive potential. SIRHAN was advised that, therefore, he would have to be advised of his Constitutional rights prior to his responding to questions.

SIRHAN inquired as to whether or not the interviewing Agents had, in fact, contacted his attorney, GODFREY ISAAC, and received his permission for the interview. SIRHAN was advised by SA [REDACTED] that the interviewing Agents had not contacted his attorney and were under no such obligation to do so.

SIRHAN stated he did not want to talk to interviewing Agents without his attorney's presence or consent. SIRHAN was advised that he was under no obligation to talk to interviewing Agents, but was requested to at least listen to an allegation received by the FBI at Los Angeles. SIRHAN indicated that he would listen, but reserve comment.

SA [REDACTED] then advised SIRHAN that the FBI had received an allegation from an individual named [REDACTED] a former inmate at Soledad, indicating that he, SIRHAN, along with other unnamed individuals outside of prison, had concocted a plot to steal a nuclear device and transport this device to MUAMMER QADDAFI, President of Libya, in exchange for forty million dollars. advice of his attorney and that in this regard should read or be read the "Interrogation; Advice of Rights" form. SIRHAN refused to read the form, but voluntarily provided the following information:

SIRHAN stated he recalled [redacted] and remembered him as a "braggart" and "con-artist". According to SIRHAN, [redacted] had "ripped-off" several inmates on "money" transactions. [redacted] according to SIRHAN, had indicated that he was to be paroled in the Los Angeles area and would like to meet SIRHAN's family and maybe get some good "Arab food". In this regard SIRHAN did furnish [redacted] with SIRHAN's mother's telephone number for possible contact.

SIRHAN stated that in view of his "notoriety", many inmates in his particular wing try to "get close" to him, but he carefully avoids getting too involved with other inmates as he does not trust them, particularly their motives. SIRHAN stated that relative to [redacted] that "he had all the ingredients of a good story for the press, all he needed was to fill in the names".

SIRHAN stated that he would never discuss his past activities nor his future plans with any inmate as he prefers merely to listen and play a passive role, inasmuch as his primary interest is to secure his parole as scheduled.

SIRHAN indicated that in recent telephone calls with his family, they had indicated that [redacted] had been calling them incessantly and they were not sure why he was so friendly. The family did indicate that they did give some sort of "party" or dinner for [redacted] but were now trying to avoid him.

SIRHAN requested that interviewing Agents contact his attorney, GODFREY ISAAC, in Los Angeles and relate the above story to him.

At no time during the interview did either interviewing Agents or SIRHAN discuss the matter for which he is currently incarcerated.

He is investigating this matter for the Board of Supervisors as a result of a motion made by Supervisor BAXTER WARD. The Board of Supervisors is trying to clear up several questions regarding this matter. [REDACTED] as a copy of a tape recording that was made when KENNEDY was shot and he does not know exactly where the tape came from. It is his recollection and information from other people that the FBI obtained a copy of a tape recording made during KENNEDY's assassination and took out some of the background noise so that what happened could be ascertained from the tape. He desired to listen to the FBI's tape and see if it was the same as his.

Former Case Agent A. O. RICHARDS was contacted regarding this matter and he said he was not aware of any tape recording that was made or enhanced by the FBI.

This information was furnished to [REDACTED] and he then stated that there were several unanswered questions which had arisen because of photographs taken in this matter by SA AL GREINER and other statements made by FBI Agents.

[REDACTED] said that he had reviewed previous files of the FBI regarding this matter and several questions were left unanswered by the FBI. He requested that the FBI make some type of statement to him regarding some of these unanswered questions.

[REDACTED] FOIA Section at the Bureau, was contacted regarding this matter and she said that a great deal of information had been released on this case and that it was all in the possession of the District Attorney in Los Angeles. She suggested that [REDACTED] review this material.

A photographic log was maintained as part of the crime-scene record. The use of the terms "bullet holes" and "bullet mark" in the photographic log to describe the photographs marked E-1, E-2, E-3, and E-4 was for the convenience of the photographic team in recording information as reported to them. Neither the photographs nor the photographic log were ever purported to be a ballistics report and as such are not intended to be demonstrative evidence of the existence of bullet holes.

The FBI conducted no ballistics examinations in this investigation.

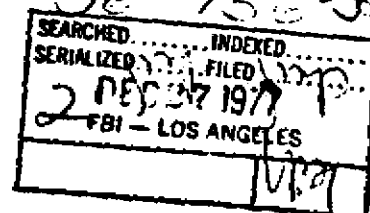

Mr. JAMES MC MANUS, [REDACTED] Indiana, advised that he went to Los Angeles, California, on Wednesday, May 29, 1968, from Oregon where he was working on the KENNEDY primary. MC MANUS said he accompanied the motorcade to downtown Los Angeles where he stopped at the Ambassador Hotel for the assignment in the California primaries. MC MANUS said that he was assigned to make arrangements for a working press room which was the Colonial Room of the Ambassador Hotel and a press distribution center which was the North Room of the Ambassador Hotel. MC MANUS stated that he was assisted by ROY RINGER of Malibu, California, and that in addition to making arrangements for the above-mentioned rooms, he and RINGER took over the registration desk of the hotel from approximately 6:00 PM, May 29, 1968, to 1:00 AM, May 30, 1968.

MC MANUS said that sometime between 9:45 and 10:30 PM, RINGER suggested that they take a break by going for a drink to a free bar which was set up near the Embassy Room of the Ambassador Hotel. MC MANUS said while sitting at a table near the free bar, a young man described as 5'3", 120 pounds, dark complexion, with heavy well-groomed black hair, wearing a sport coat with blue stripes and contrasting trousers and a dark tie open at the neck, approached him and asked for the schedule of Senator KENNEDY for the two following days, May 30 and 31, 1968. MC MANUS said his first thought was "what's a Mexican American reporter doing here in Oregon", but then he recalled he was in California. MC MANUS answered that he did not have the schedule but that the individual could obtain the same by going to 5615 Wilshire Boulevard or calling there. MC MANUS stated that the individual then asked what time the Senator would be in that evening, to which MC MANUS answered 11:00 PM. MC MANUS said he then assumed that the individual worked for a radio station in that radio stations send young people who are inexperienced whereas newspaper media are more apt to send older, more experienced personnel. MC MANUS stated that the individual had a Wednesday schedule in his right coat pocket and that he said, "I have today's schedule".

MC MANUS advised that he went back to the registration desk of the hotel at approximately 11:00 PM, whereupon the press contingent came up the stairs. MC MANUS said that he thought the Senator was back in the hotel at this time because of the return of the press contingent.

MC MANUS said he checked people in until approximately 1:00 AM, May 30, 1968.

MC MANUS recalled that he saw the individual the second time between 11:00 and 12:00 during a short trip to the North Room at which time the individual again asked the question regarding the Senator's schedule, whereupon MC MANUS informed him that he must go to 5615 Wilshire Boulevard to obtain the same.

MC MANUS further stated that sometime after he saw the first individual (probably Wednesday morning or early afternoon) two Latin types described as well dressed, olive skin, thin faced, well-groomed dark hair with long sideburns, and wearing dark business suits, also asked for the schedule. MC MANUS added that these two individuals looked enough alike to be cousins.

MC MANUS advised that he left on Thursday afternoon to go to New York City for campaign arrangements there.

Upon being exhibited a photograph of SIRHAN SIRHAN, MC MANUS said that the face on view looked like the first individual, but that he could not be positive. He, MC MANUS added that the photograph looked a little messed up and that he had the impression that the first individual mentioned above may have had longer sideburns; however, he added the photograph of SIRHAN SIRHAN seemed to him to not be totally unfamiliar. MC MANUS said that the photograph of SIRHAN SIRHAN did not in any way resemble the two Latin types mentioned above.

MC MANUS recalled that his first reaction after seeing news media photographs was that he vaguely remembered seeing someone very similar to SIRHAN SIRHAN.

MC MANUS further stated that he could not be certain if it was the first individual in the Ambassador Hotel the night of May 29, 1968, but someone was wearing a pair of dark brown buckle loafers, with a sheen, made of large grain leather with the buckle across the instep. MC MANUS added that he appreciates good shoes, and that for some reason these stood out in his mind, perhaps because they were uncared for.

MC MANUS finally stated that it was possible that ROY RINGER of Malibu, California, may have seen and could recall the first individual mentioned above. MC MANUS added that he did not know

what RINGER's address was; however, he was sure that he, RINGER, could be contacted through PAT BROWN's Law Office, in Los Angeles, California.

MC MANUS further added that either LISA GWIRTZMAN and/or CONSTANCE CHANCELLOR were present when the two Latin types asked for the Senator's schedule of May 30, 1968. According to MC MANUS, LISA GWIRTZMAN lives in New York City and could be contacted through [REDACTED]

PUETZ recalled that he had been with a group of students from [REDACTED] who accompanied Senator ROBERT KENNEDY to Portland, Oregon, and to Los Angeles, California. At the time of the assault on Senator KENNEDY, PUETZ was in the vestibule at the main entrance to the Embassy Room of the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles. He stated he did not hear of the assault until he got downstairs to the room, where their group were to meet with Senator KENNEDY. He then heard of the assault from the news media.

He advised he never saw SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN at any time and advised he had no knowledge of any conspiracy upon the life of Senator KENNEDY.

He stated the only person he knew who had actually been in the Embassy Room prior to the assault was LARRY DAKER, whose home is in Chicago, Illinois, and who transferred from St. Meinrad College to Dayton University, Dayton, Ohio.

He had not seen DAKER subsequent to the tragedy and had no information concerning DAKER's exact location at the time of the assault. He stated he knew DAKER had been in the Embassy Room, because he observed him on one of the television monitors, during the meeting prior to the assault.

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CHARLES D. WHITE, home address [redacted] Date April 16, 1969
 senior at [redacted] South Carolina, advised that he is presently a student coordinator for the primary campaign to Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY. He became very active during the primary campaign in Southern Indiana and subsequently went with Senator KENNEDY to Oregon and California.

He recalls being in the Ambassador Hotel Ballroom at Los Angeles, California, the night Senator KENNEDY was shot. WHITE stated that he stood at the lower left hand corner of the platform, facing the platform, during Senator KENNEDY's victory speech and at the time was with a friend ANDY T. EZZELL, [redacted] Indianapolis, Indiana, telephone number [redacted]. He and EZZELL were together the major part of the evening.

Towards the end of KENNEDY's speech, WHITE moved over to the right corner of the platform to be close to the Senator when he left the stage. It had been generally believed by the KENNEDY people that Senator KENNEDY would come off stage and enter the crowd but a sudden change in plans occurred and the Senator did not enter the crowd but proceeded towards the passage way into the kitchen area. Senator KENNEDY was approximately 25 feet in front of WHITE at the time he was shot. WHITE stated that people began screaming, mass confusion set in, and he didn't hear the shots or see anything. WHITE admitted that at the time of the shooting, when he realized what had happened, he became hysterical, began crying and fell in the passageway bumping his head on a corner of a door. Some KENNEDY aides, JOE HIGDEN being one in particular, inquired regarding WHITE's injury and when it was found out he had simply a cut, he received medical attention and remained in the lobby area. Later on he saw the police bringing Sirhan Sirhan out of the lobby. He stated he had never seen Sirhan before this. WHITE noted no unusual activity in the Ballroom area prior to the shooting incident and stated he had passed through the kitchen area of the Ambassador Hotel earlier that evening but noted nothing in particular.

He next observed Senator KENNEDY being placed in an ambulance and also observed CHUCK WHITE, KATHY CWIK and her fiance RUSS DAVIS.

NICO then walked around alone for a while around the main floor area where the Ballroom was and proceeded to the Rafferty Headquarters where he called his parents in Lansing, Michigan, and advised them of what had happened. It was then approximately 5 am in Lansing, Michigan.

Later on that same morning, NICO stated he went to a room where an alleged KENNEDY aide who seemed to have more information on the shooting than anyone else there, was eating and drinking and making merry. He did not know the in-

dividual's name. The individual stated, "Senator Kennedy's aides did not know he was to proceed through the kitchen and that if they had known, they would have been in front of him." This individual further stated that the plans had been changed suddenly at the last minute, and that had he known plans, he could have been in front of KENNEDY. This individual further stated he was with KENNEDY when he was shot, he grabbed at the fellow with the gun, and helped WAYFORD JOHNSON disarm the individual and later hit a cameraman who got in the way. NICO stated this individual, who indicated he was a close KENNEDY aide, was well dresses and had an Eastern accent, from New York or Boston, and appeared to be very nervous. The big question in NICO's mind was if he was the KENNEDY aide, why was he there at the Ambassador Hotel with the low ratio on aides and organizers and workers and if he was not an aide, if he was a phony, what was his true identity. NICO stated that he had no particular reason to think that this individual was involved in any sort of conspiracy, however, he was acting in a very aloof and unmessed manner in the situation when everyone else was hysterical and very saddened and this perplexed NICO along with quite a few of the other KENNEDY workers.

He described this individual was being a white, male, age approximately 30 to 32, 6'2" tall, 195 pounds, medium build, black hair (straight and short), dark eyes, very well dresses, characteristics - stuttered and blushed very noticeably.

NICO stated that other individuals who noticed this person were JIM C. BAILEY, [REDACTED] Portland, Oregon, telephone number [REDACTED] and JOHN PUTZ, of Fowler, Indiana.

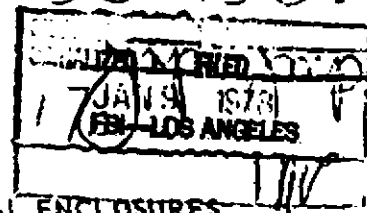

Miss CHARLENE LEWIS was interviewed at the residence of her parents, [REDACTED] where she arrived on December 19, 1968, to recuperate from an illness. She stated her residence address is care of [REDACTED] New York, New York, and her employer is [REDACTED] Time-Life Building, New York. She stated she could be reached at her employer's, telephone number [REDACTED]

Miss LEWIS advised that between May 20, 1968, and July 7, 1968, she was staying with relatives in Los Angeles, California, while she worked as a volunteer for the Speeches and Issues Bureau of the Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY Campaign Staff. She stated that in connection with this work she entered the Embassy Room of the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, California, between 8:30 and 9:00 P.M., June 4, 1968. She said that Senator KENNEDY came into this room about midnight and talked for about ten to fifteen minutes to the group assembled there. She said that when he finished his talk he left this room and went through a hall to the kitchen or pantry area adjacent to this room. KENNEDY, at the hotel.

Mrs. HOCH stated that she had registered at the above hotel as a member of a group of individuals being part of a Greyhound tour. Mr. BAILEY advised that to the very best of his recollection he did not see JAMES NICO on the night that Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY was assassinated.

Mr. BAILEY advised that on the night of the assassination, possibly four or five hours after the assassination occurred, he and approximately six other persons slept in a room which had been obtained for them at the Ambassador Hotel, and he said that this was a sleeping room only and there were no eats or drinks consumed by anyone in this room. He said that the campaign workers who were staying in this particular room were all from Indiana or Oregon.

Mr. BAILEY recalled that there was a room used by the campaign workers and the aids of KENNEDY in the press room on the main floor of the Ambassador Hotel but he has no memory whatsoever of any person being in this press room who answered the description as given by JAMES NICO who did not seem to be concerned about KENNEDY's assassination.

Mr. BAILEY advised that during the campaign he had met another young man whom he knows only by the first name of "JIM" and this young man was a bonafide friend and close associate of the KENNEDY family and had acted as a "front man" during the campaign. BAILEY said that this young man would usually be in the party close to ETHYL KENNEDY.

According to BAILEY, he assumes that this was the young man of whom JAMES NICO was speaking as this young man whom he knew only as "JIM" did have short black hair and was approximately 28 years of age, with a medium build; and this young man had black hair which was straight and short. BAILEY said that the only difference he can tell in the description as given by NICO and his own recollection is that this particular person was no more than six feet tall. BAILEY advised that it was his recollection that this young man came from the East Coast, possibly from near Boston, and this young man did have a tendency to grope for his words but he did not actually stutter.

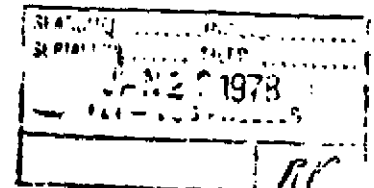

ROBERT L. TAYLOR, [REDACTED] Severna Park, Maryland, advised that he is self employed as the executive representative for Automatic Retailers of America, with offices in his home, where he resides with his wife and family. He furnished the following information:

He was a volunteer worker in the Kennedy Campaign and had been placed in charge of the businessmen's committee for the State of California. He spent most of the month of May, 1968, in California, in connection with this campaign and stayed, for the most part, in cabana 14B of the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, California.

On June 4-5, 1968, TAYLOR was at the Ambassador Hotel and about 15-30 minutes before the assassination of Senator KENNEDY, he had left the shooting scene at the hotel and was in his cabana taking a shower, getting ready for departure on June 5, 1968, for his home in Maryland. He estimated that cabana 14B was approximately 100 yards from the front entrance to the hotel. He stated he did not hear any shot at about 12:15 A.M. on June 5, 1968, but that he got out of his shower at about that time because of the loud level of noise from the hotel and thereafter learned of the shooting.

He was not acquainted with SIRHAN B. SIRHAN, could not recall seeing him and had no information concerning the assassination of Senator KENNEDY from personal knowledge. He stated he could not get into the area of the shooting scene shortly after the shooting because of the crowds and the restrictions of the police department.

He stated that this reservation was made by the American College of Hospital Administration, San Francisco, California and that he had gone to Los Angeles to attend a seminar on a hospital administration which began on June 3, 1968 and continued through June 6, 1968. Upon arrival at the Ambassador Hotel, he discovered that in addition to the seminar on hospital administration there were several other conventions and political meetings being held.

After checking into the hotel, Dr. BONNET had his dinner in the hotel and went to his room where he retired at approximately 10:30 P.M. Around 12:30 or 1 A.M. on June 5, 1968 he was awakened by someone knocking at his door and upon checking, found out that it was someone who had the wrong room. He stated that he then went back to sleep and when he awakened the next morning, he heard over his television that Senator ROBERT KENNEDY had been assassinated in the hotel. He stated that he did not see Senator KENNEDY upon his arrival at the hotel and upon viewing the photograph of SIRHAN SIRHAN he stated that he did not see anyone who resembled this picture.

Dr. BONNET stated that he has no information regarding the shooting of Senator KENNEDY and that it was quite a shock to him when he heard of it on the morning of June 5, 1968. He further stated that he had no information concerning any possible conspiracy in the shooting of Senator KENNEDY.

CARMINE BELLINO, Certified Public Accountant, [REDACTED] Bethesda, Maryland, was interviewed and he furnished the following:

BELLINO was registered at the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, California, on June 4, 1968. The reason he was there was because he was working on the presidential campaign of Senator ROBERT KENNEDY.

BELLINO spent part of the evening of June 4, 1968, in the main lobby of the Ambassador Hotel and he had anticipated that KENNEDY would make an appearance there. KENNEDY, however, never made an appearance there. After the shots were fired at KENNEDY due to the confusion BELLINO was not able to enter and he eventually went to his own room.

BELLINO recalled that two firemen appeared at the door of the above hotel at the main lobby and as there were too many people there the firemen thinned the crowd out by preventing people from entering and in some instances people that went out were not able to get back in. Later in the evening, however, before midnight, the firemen began letting everyone in and the place rapidly became very crowded. BELLINO thought this was very unusual but could not attach any particular significance to this or connect it with events at the hotel that night. He merely brought this out during the interview as it was the only unusual thing he could recall happening at the hotel, which he observed, prior to the assassination.

He had no information indicating a possible conspiracy in this matter, he did not know SIRHAN B. SIRHAN, and had no recollection of seeing him about the Ambassador Hotel on the night of June 4, 1968.

Mrs. STEWART is the wife of RICHARD H. STEWART, a reporter of the Boston Globe, and she was registered at the Ambassador Hotel, Los Angeles, California, on June 4, 1968. Mrs. STEWART spent the evening and night in her hotel room watching the campaign activities on television. She was not circulating around the hotel downstairs around the time of the assassination. Mr. STEWART was at a television studio at Burbank, California, that night.

The only things that she noted which she would consider unusual was a party in an adjoining room which was very noisy, and which continued to be so even after the word of the assassination of Senator KENNEDY was publicized on radio and television. She also felt that it was unusual when a helicopter on the helicopter pad at the hotel left just after the ambulance left the hotel with, presumably, Senator KENNEDY, and the helicopter did not put its lights on until it reached an altitude over the building. While this struck her as unusual, she had no information which would connect the incident with the assassination of Senator KENNEDY.

She was in possession of no information which would indicate a possible conspiracy in the KENNEDY assassination, she did not know SIRHAN B. SIRHAN, nor did she ever recall seeing him about the Ambassador Hotel on the night of June 4, 1968.

MAX JOHNSON, [REDACTED] Baltimore, Maryland, advised that he is employed as a news reporter by the Baltimore Afro-American Newspaper, located at 628 North Eutaw Street, Baltimore, Maryland. Mr. JOHNSON states that he was assigned to the coverage of the political campaign of the late Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY in Los Angeles, California.

Mr. JOHNSON was at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles on June 4-5, 1968, when Senator KENNEDY was killed, but he did not actually witness the killing. Mr. JOHNSON states that, as best as he can recall, he was on his way to that part of the Ambassador Hotel where Senator KENNEDY was expected to talk to various representatives of the press, when the assassination of Senator KENNEDY occurred.

Mr. JOHNSON advised that after Senator KENNEDY had finished his main address he, JOHNSON, left the hall with the intention of getting to the room in advance of the crowd, so that he would have a good seat and be in a position to best hear the remarks that Senator KENNEDY was expected to make to various representatives of the press. JOHNSON stated that he never saw the person who killed Senator KENNEDY at anytime and knows nothing of the assassination except what he heard from individuals and from what he read in the press.

Mr. JOHNSON does not recall when he last spoke to RICHARD AUBREY of the Pacific Coast News Bureau, but he knows that he was not in the kitchen passageway at anytime with AUBREY or anyone else.

RICHARD JOSEPH LITTLE was interviewed at his place of employment, [REDACTED] Montana, where he is employed as a salesman. LITTLE advised as follows:

MYDA FOOTE is his former mother-in-law. She is also known as Myda Fredericks and is married to FREDERICK J. FOOTE, who also uses the name of Dean Fredericks. They reside in apartment [REDACTED] California.

LITTLE was visiting them in Los Angeles, California, while on vacation from his job, and accompanied them to the AMBASSADOR HOTEL, Embassy Room, where ROBERT F. KENNEDY was to speak on June 4, 1968. On the night of June 4, 1968, while Senator KENNEDY spoke in the Embassy Room of the AMBASSADOR HOTEL, LITTLE was standing with Mr. and Mrs. FOOTE about 30 feet from the podium used by Senator KENNEDY.

MYDA FOOTE was then reportedly on Senator KENNEDY's staff attached to the Mexican-American Committee as a volunteer worker.

LITTLE stated after Senator KENNEDY finished his speech and stepped off the podium, he was unable to see him, due to the large crowd packed into the Embassy Room. He and the FOOTES thought Senator KENNEDY would leave the Embassy Room via the corridor to the lobby and they, therefore, moved toward a large television set, which was located in the Embassy Room, and toward the corridor. Instead, Senator KENNEDY left the Embassy Room via a door leading toward the kitchen and was not seen by LITTLE or his companions.

LITTLE stated he did not hear any shots fired and did not see SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN at any time prior to the shooting. On being shown photographs of SIRHAN, Los Angeles Police Department #BK-495,139, taken on June 5, 1968, he advised he saw this individual in the custody of police officers, when the officers brought him through the corridor of the AMBASSADOR HOTEL after the shooting. He did not get a good look at him then, due to the large crowd jammed together.

LITTLE recalled, after Senator KENNEDY left the podium and Embassy Room, apparently toward the kitchen, one of the KENNEDY girls, in uniform, whose identity he did not know, came running out of the kitchen to the lobby of the Embassy Room shouting, "They shot him". He was unable to hear or determine who she was referring to. Later, someone said Senator KENNEDY had been shot. He then heard someone shouting, "Don't kill him". He thought this person was referring to SIRHAN.

By this time, he stated he made his way to the door leading from the Embassy Room toward the kitchen and, while there, someone said, "Don't let anyone else in". He, thereafter, assisted in keeping people from entering the door leading to the kitchen, but he did recall he let in three doctors and one priest, while he was standing there.

LITTLE stated he thought he recalled looking at his watch about the time someone mentioned Senator KENNEDY had been shot and, insofar as he can recall, the time was 12:13 a.m., June 5, 1968.

The HSCA now wants all files pertaining to the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) investigation of the assassination of ROBERT KENNEDY. [REDACTED] interprets this as meaning reports. He said it is also possible the reports would have been incorporated into FBI reports.

A cursory review of Los Angeles files indicates the following type of LAPD materials in the Los Angeles FBI files:

- 1) LAPD report re arrest, transportation and booking of SIRHAN.
- 2) Transcripts of LAPD tape recorded interviews of SIRHAN.
- 3) LAPD interview reports of various witnesses.
- 4) Requests from LAPD to interview "out of area" witnesses.

It is noted that during July 1975, DAVE PEREZ, Deputy Los Angeles City Attorney, commented regarding disclosure of LAPD originated material in FBI files to outside persons under FOIPA requests directed to the Bureau. Details are contained in serial 3159 of Volume 16, which also indicates that of three complete reports prepared by the LAPD, two are retained by the LAPD and one was designated for the Attorney General of the United States for placing in the National Archives. Commander RAY RUDEL previously advised the Los Angeles Office in June 1975 that his department is totally opposed to dissemination of LAPD investigative results under FOIPA.

The LAPD position in regard to this recent request by HSCA is unknown and it is suggested that the LAPD Deputy Chief in charge of records be contacted by SSAC GUNDERSON or an SAC to determine their position on this matter.

Assistant Chief HARVEY advised that the Chief Counsel for the House Select Committee on Assassinations (HSCA) recently contacted the office of the Chief of Police, LAPD, regarding request for documents concerning the KENNEDY assassination and that request is still pending, awaiting the return of Chief of Police DARYL GATES to the City of Los Angeles on 5/19/78. HARVEY stated that it is the position of the Police Department that any Police Department documents and/or records should be made available by the Police Department and not through a third party such as the FBI. He further stated that the LAPD prefers to deal directly with the Committee and sees no necessity for the Committee to be in touch with the Bureau for the purpose of obtaining Police Department records.

He advised that, to the best of his recollection, on June 4, 1968, he went to work at approximately 10:00 PM. He said he is not a Democrat and was not interested in the rally being held by Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY in the Embassy Ballroom of the Ambassador Hotel.

He advised at approximately 1:00 AM on June 5, 1968, to the best of his recollection, he was awakened from a very sound sleep by what appeared to him to be police car sirens.

Mr. BARNETT advised that he got out of bed and fully dressed himself and attempted to go downstairs where the commotion appeared to be taking place. He said he was prohibited from doing this by police officers, who had blocked off all elevators and stairwells. He said he lost interest in the matter when the police refused him to enter the downstairs area of the hotel and he returned to his room, number 355, and went back to sleep.

TERRY MICKEY WELCH, [REDACTED] advised that he recognized SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN from photographs on telecast concerning the attempt on the life of Senator ROBERT F. KENNEDY. WELCH then called WWJ Television, Detroit, Michigan, and made them aware of the fact that he knew SIRHAN and he was subsequently interviewed on that station.

WELCH stated that he first met SIRHAN approximately three years ago when both were employed as exercise boys at Granja Vista Del Rio, a thoroughbred horse farm located at Corona, California, and owned by BURT ALTAFISH (phonetic). From that time until May, 1967, WELCH was closely associated with SIRHAN and considered him to be his closest friend. He said that approximately 1½ years ago, probably between September, 1966 and December, 1966, SIRHAN suffered a very bad fall from a horse at Granja Vista Del Rio and was admitted to the hospital at Corona, where he remained in critical condition for several weeks. He suffered head and back injuries which resulted in his being partially blind in his left eye and since the time of the accident, he has suffered from severe headaches. WELCH stated that SIRHAN was supposed to get a settlement as a result of this accident and was angry because he did not get as much as he thought he should.

WELCH advised that SIRHAN underwent a complete personality change after the above-described accident. He stated that prior to that time, SIRHAN had been good natured and easy to get along with. He was popular with other employees at the horse farm and with horse owners who kept race horses at this farm. WELCH listed DESI ARNEZ, BUDDY EBSON, and DALE ROBERTSON, prominent television personalities, as horse owners who were well acquainted with SIRHAN. He described SIRHAN prior to the accident as well mannered, neat, clean, intelligent, and a gentlemen in every way. He said that while SIRHAN was thrifty and would sometimes save his checks for three or four weeks before cashing them, he was also generous in providing money to friends who were temporarily in need, and in addition stated that although SIRHAN did not drink himself, he accompanied WELCH and other employees to local bars and would often purchase drinks for everyone present.

Following his fall from the horse in 1966, SIRHAN became a "loner" who was resentful toward anyone who had wealth. He, at this time, became unpredictable and unreliable in that he would make plans to do things or go places with WELCH and then for no apparent reason would change his mind.

After he was released from the hospital at Corona, SIRHAN obtained a job with ROBERT WHEELER, an owner and trainer at the Santa Anita Race Track. He remained on this job for 3 to 5 weeks and when he found that he did not know enough about the job, he quit and went back to Granja Vista Del Rio to learn more about handling horses. WELCH said SIRHAN had a great desire to be a good rider and although he was frightened after the accident, he refused to quit riding even after being repeatedly thrown from horses.

TERRY WELCH advised that SIRHAN was also known as Sol by race track acquaintances and fellow employees. He said that inasmuch as persons of all nationalities frequent race tracks and horse farms, he and SIRHAN worked with Mexicans, Negroes, Irish, Greeks, Italians, Jews, and Hungarians, and SIRHAN never gave any indication to him of prejudice toward any nationality. He said that before the accident SIRHAN was curious and was always attempting to learn and improve himself. He would visit dairy and poultry farms for example during his off-duty hours, and could talk intelligently on almost any subject. He spoke excellent English with little or no accent. He was an avid reader, particularly with regard to law and frequently discussed cases which he had read about. SIRHAN did not appear to be particularly interested in politics and WELCH does not recall any pertinent discussions of political issues.

SIRHAN appeared to be devoted to his mother and told WELCH he visited his mother in Pasadena, California every other weekend when he was not working. WELCH said he never went with SIRHAN to visit his mother and does not know the names of any of SIRHAN's relatives, but recalls SIRHAN stated his mother's name was MARY. His father was overseas, according to SIRHAN, and supposedly wealthy.

WELCH believes that the Reverend LEO HILL, Circle City Baptist Church, Ninth and Sheridan, Corona, would possibly know SIRHAN inasmuch as SIRHAN gave WELCH a card for this church and suggested that he see Reverend HILL when he was having personal problems.

SIRHAN told WELCH on one occasion that he had been expelled from a college in Los Angeles, California as a result of trouble with a girl. This incident supposedly occurred before WELCH and SIRHAN became acquainted.

SIRHAN also stated that at one time he had worked for a gun or skeet club in the Corona or Los Angeles area. WELCH believed that BURT ALTAFIGH would possibly have more information concerning this.

TERRY WELCH said that when he first learned about SIRHAN's connection with the assault on Senator KENNEDY, he could not believe that SIRHAN had shot KENNEDY because he had previously been such a "nice guy". He has not seen or had contact with SIRHAN since May, 1967. He does not believe that SIRHAN would have committed this assault for money, nor would he have been involved in a conspiracy. With regard to the money allegedly in SIRHAN's possession when he was captured, WELCH said it would not be unusual for SIRHAN to carry large sums of money in his pocket inasmuch as he was a thrifty individual and when he and WELCH were closely associated, SIRHAN habitually kept his wallet in the glove compartment of his car, which WELCH described as a 1950 or 1951 DeSoto. WELCH said it was common practice for race track employees to keep their wallets in the glove compartments of cars to prevent theft from their persons.


In conversations with fellow employees who were refugees from Communist countries, such as Cuba and Hungary, SIRHAN always gave WELCH the impression that he was very much opposed to Communism. He indicated a liking for the United States and never exhibited any particular loyalty or feeling toward the country of his birth, Jordan. WELCH said he does not recall having ever heard SIRHAN mention being or living in any state other than California in the United States.

WELCH concluded by stating that he feels that the personality change which took place in SIRHAN BISHARA SIRHAN after his accident must have gotten worse in the past year since WELCH has had contact with him, and that he "went out of his mind, or that something was preying on his mind."

WELCH said that SIRHAN was particularly friendly with FRANK DONORAMA, one of the bosses or supervisors at Granja Vista Del Rio. He added that prior to SIRHAN's accident, BURT ALTAFISH had been so impressed with SIRHAN's potential that he offered SIRHAN a good administrative job at Granja Vista Del Rio. SIRHAN declined this offer inasmuch as he preferred to work directly with the horses and become a good rider.
